When Stuart left Highbury at the end of 2005 he was reading fluently, and continued to grow in confidence throughout high school. His achievements included:

- Going from strength to strength in all academic areas;
- KZN colours for shooting;
- Matriculating with three distinctions;
- Gaining a scholarship to a university in the USA, where he is studying Business and Environmental Science;
- Being honoured as a Dean's List award recipient – twice in two years.

Stuart's story is echoed in the lives of many other boys, as Highbury continues to release the potential within all its pupils. The new Learning Support Programme promises to add many more names to this growing list of success stories – boys who are establishing a strong foundation, no matter what their learning challenges.

The new Learning Support Programme at Highbury shows the school's dedication to offering personalised intervention programmes to boys requiring special needs support

Highbury's Learning and Discovery (LAD) Centre has been at the heart of many success stories in recent years. Established in 1997, the centre draws boys out of mainstream circulation, where necessary, for regular sessions of intervention therapy. This is aimed

at equipping each boy with coping, processing and compensation skills, so aiding them in their day-to-day classroom learning activities.
