Sydney Barlow - Class of 1958



One of the greatest privileges of travelling on **rugby tour** is witnessing the enduring bond between generations of Highbury boys. Whilst competing at the Independent Schools Rugby Festival at St David's in Johannesburg, our 1st XV Rugby Team had the pleasure of meeting Highbury Old Boy, Sydney Barlow, who was there watching his grandson. After spending time chatting with our coaches and Mr Brandon Harvey, who presented Sydney with his original Highbury 1st XV rugby cap, Sydney wrote to thank them for making his visit so memorable and shared some memories of his time at Highbury in the late 1950's.

Sydney arrived at Threave House as a Standard One pupil and recalls, with great humour, how his siblings secretly packed their mother's jewellery into his suitcase "to give some comfort while away from home," resulting in his parents making the journey back from Isipingo to retrieve the precious cargo. He fondly remembers moving into the school dormitory in Standard 2, where every belonging was marked with his school number, 24, and how all the sporting equipment was kept in one large communal box. Looking back, he says this taught one of Highbury's greatest life lessons: "All in this together."

Like generations of boarders, Sydney's memories are filled with the simple joys of school life – playing marbles and games of catch across the quadrangle, organising cricket matches using a tree near the tuck shop as the wickets, eagerly searching for leftover toast, butter and jam after breakfast, and enjoying chocolate blancmange, affectionately nicknamed "Tugela Mud." Saturday family visits, hidden cake tins and listening to classical music in P.G. Bryant's study before the reward of an Elvis Presley record all remain treasured memories.

One story, however, stood above the rest. After leaving Highbury, a teacher at his new school asked where he had previously attended. When Sydney replied, "Highbury," the teacher responded: "Ah, I knew you were different from these boys." Sydney never regarded that as a compliment to himself, but rather as a reflection of the values Highbury instilled in its boys.

"Highbury was, and remains today, a place that provides young men, cultured in every sense of the word, to play their part in making a meaningful contribution to society." Nearly 70 years after beginning his Highbury journey, Sydney's memories remind us that while the school has evolved, its values continue to shape generations of Highbury boys.

Shaun Deutschmann - Class of 2003



During his time at Highbury, Shaun was an enthusiastic sportsman, representing the school in rugby and water polo, and serving as a prefect in his final year. His school days are filled with fond memories, from adventurous camping trips at Hilton with Mr Harris, to lively Mathematics lessons with Mr Tibbs Dollar and his ever-present Jack Russell, and memorable science experiments in the lab, some of which he has promised to recreate with his children.

In 2017, Shaun returned to a place that played such an important role in his childhood when he married his wife, Holly, in the Highbury Chapel.

"One of the most memorable parts of our wedding was everyone searching for my Centenary kneeling cushion in the Chapel. It became such a talking point, and even today Dominic still looks for it during Grandparents' Day or Carols in the Chapel." Today, Shaun and Holly are proud parents to Dominic and Sophia. Dominic is now in Grade 3 at Highbury, following in his father's footsteps, while Sophia has recently started at St Mary's. They also run Gordini Breakdown Services, a Durban-based transport and towing company.

Shaun and Dominic often compare Highbury experiences across generations, from Wednesday lunches (hot dogs in Shaun's day) to familiar spaces like the Library, Centenary Hall, and Drama rooms. Even Weavers' Nest, once the boarding houses, still come up in family stories. Watching Dominic in his Highbury uniform has been a great source of pride for Shaun.

"There is something very special about watching Dominic experience Highbury for himself. The values, traditions, and sense of belonging are still so evident, and it brings back so many memories while creating new ones at the same time."

Graeme Sperry - Class of 1976



Although thousands of kilometres now separate him from Highbury, the memories of his school days remain as vivid as ever for **Graeme "Gegs" Sperry**, Dux of his year.

Today, Graeme is a successful partner at Siskinds, one of Southwestern Ontario's leading law firms, having built an accomplished legal career that has taken him from South Africa to Canada and, more recently, to the United Kingdom. Unable to attend his 50-Year Reunion, Graeme sent a heartfelt message to his classmates, reflecting on the adventures and life lessons that shaped their formative years.

"I have very fond memories of my Highbury years and all of the friendships made, several of which endure to this day. I am grateful that I had the chance to have been part of the life of the school. As a boarder for five years, this was certainly a community – a family of small boys working out together, the challenges and joys of our youth."

As a Highbury boy, Graeme excelled both academically and in service to the school. He was awarded the Michaelhouse Scholarship, the Keith Wimble Trophy for the boy who had done the most for the school, and earned prizes for Reading, Drama, English and Latin.

Looking back, Graeme recalled a very different Highbury, where almost two-thirds of his class were boarders. Boys came from across KwaZulu-Natal, as well as Zambia, Mozambique and Swaziland, creating lifelong friendships across cultures and distances. His memories of early mornings in the dormitories, Friday evening hit parades, victorious bus trips home from away matches, Sunday birthday celebrations in the Dining Hall, and many adventures brought both laughter and nostalgia to his classmates.

Among the stories were memories of Tommy Bedford-inspired haircuts, yo-yos, skateboards, makeshift common rooms, digging for old .22 shell casings near the old armoury and the inevitable disagreements settled "behind the practice wall". Yet beneath the humour was a deeper appreciation for what Highbury gave its boys.

"We learned about places and experiences beyond our own, and learned to get along with one another, finding comraderie along the way. Highbury – with its dedicated teachers, staff, and matrons – created a vigorous environment in which we were not coddled, but shaped through excellent teaching, wonderful sport, and cultural activities into young men ready for high school, university, military service, and life beyond."

Stuart Corbishley - Class of 1998



Stuart Corbishley (Class of 1998) is a loyal Highbury Old Boy who recently returned to the school with his wife and son while visiting family in Durban. His visit brought back a wave of fond memories of his time at Highbury, where he started in 1995 in Standard 2 and left in 1998 in Grade 7.

Stuart often reflects on his early days in the computer room under the guidance of Mr Godfrey. At the time, the technology was basic compared to today, but it was there that a genuine interest in computers and problem solving began to take shape. In his Grade 7 year, he was awarded Honours for Information Technology, and he credits Mr Godfrey for helping to spark a passion that would go on to shape his future.

During his recent visit to Highbury, he was especially impressed to see the newly upgraded IT room and the range of modern software and tools now available to boys, a striking contrast to the early days he remembers so well.

That early curiosity has since grown into an impressive career in technology. Stuart is now Co-founder and CTO of OpenFn, a company that helps scale public health and humanitarian interventions through data integration, automation and interoperability. The best part, OpenFn is open source, free to the world! He is an experienced software engineer and a strong commitment to open source collaboration. His approach blends thoughtful systems design with a focus on user experience, usability, and building robust, maintainable software. <https://www.openfn.org>

Beyond software, Stuart has also worked professionally as a photographer, reflecting a creative versatility that continues to define his work. Now based in Cape Town, Stuart's journey is testament to how early experiences at Highbury can spark lifelong passions. From a small computer room in the 1990s to leading global technology solutions today, his story reflects curiosity, dedication and the lasting impact of teachers who inspire.



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For many in the Highbury community, the Cluver family will be a familiar name. Richard and Liz Cluver are past Highbury parents, with their sons Paul and Ross having attended the school, while Liz served on the Highbury Board for many years.

Richard Cluver has spent a lifetime immersed in the world of finance and investment. Andre Brink- Class of 1978

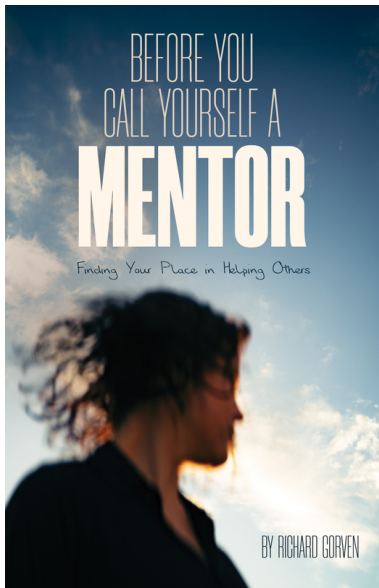

"I grew up in Zululand and like so many other boys my folks sent me to Highbury as there were no other boarding schools in the area. I only have happy memories of my time there and many of my closest friends remain from those early years spent at Highbury.

We also had some amazing teachers and one Peter Liddle stands out. He taught us science and coached the 1st & 2nd XV's and although you were often at the receiving end of his mini cricket bat or old comrades tekkie he remains one of our fondest teachers for the discipline he instilled in us from such an early age. We had a particularly good final year and there were few prep schools who could claim that they had beaten Highbury at any sport that year."

Today, Andre is Group Export Manager at Edward Snell & Co, and remains a proud Highbury Old Boy.

Richard Gorven - Class of 2004



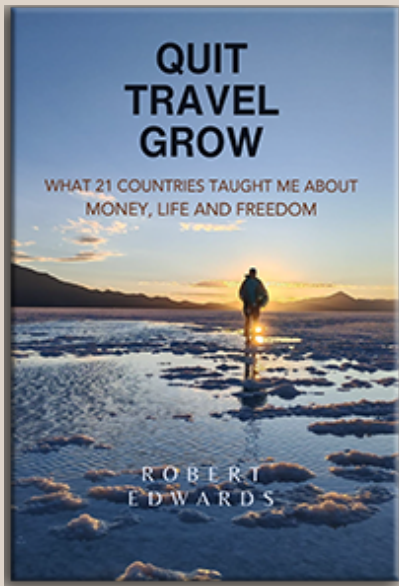
From the classrooms of Highbury to mentoring the next generation, Richard Gorven has dedicated his life to investing in young people. Richard is Creative Director of Trulife, a non-profit organisation that helps students make brave choices that lead to better futures. He also works with the Global Leadership Network International, sharing stories of impact from around the world, and serves on the GLS Next Gen Leadership Team.

Over the past two decades, Richard has mentored young people through church ministry, Bible college lecturing, youth leadership, creative projects, music, and work with a range of corporates and non-profit organisations. At the heart of everything he does is a passion for helping others grow into the people they were created to be. Richard is also the author of *Before You Call Yourself a Mentor*, offering practical wisdom and encouragement for anyone who wants to make a meaningful difference in another person's life.

Looking back at his Highbury days, Richard shares, "I have the most incredible memories from Highbury. From long afternoons spent reading the works of Brian Jacques and J.R.R. Tolkien in the library (shoutout to Mrs Bowen and Mr Gumede), to running around the grounds with my friends in a world of our own. At Highbury, I was encouraged to be myself, to take the road less travelled, and to explore who I was beyond the surface level. Teachers like Mrs Scott (my piano teacher) allowed me to explore my passion for music in a way that differed from everyone else's, unlocking something within me. It was moments and encounters like those that made Highbury special and instilled in me the importance of always seeing the individual, embracing a "one size fits one" mentality. These are themes that have stayed with me and have found a home in my writing as well."

Robert Edwards - Class of 2002



For Robert Edwards (Class of 2002), some of his fondest Highbury memories include playing boarders' rugby, taking part in the Friday current affairs quiz, and spending countless hours playing hand slam. Like many boarders of his era, he also remembers quickly falling into line whenever Mr Dollar's Jack Russell made an appearance. After Highbury, Robert went on to Hilton College and then studied in the US. After a few years back in SA he then went to the UK, where he spent seven years in London building a successful career in finance, eventually becoming a Managing Director at a corporate finance firm. Yet despite his professional success, Robert felt it was time for a change and at the age of 35, made a life-changing decision to embark on a year-long journey through 21 countries across Africa, Asia, Australasia and both North and South America.

His travels took him from the favelas of Brazil to the mountains of Bolivia, from the tobacco farms of Cuba and to the slums in India and Ethiopia as well as cities like Hong Kong and Detroit. Along the way he explored different cultures, economies and ways of life, learning how people around the world think about money and what it means to live a meaningful life. One of the highlights of the journey was learning Kung Fu at the original Shaolin Temple in China. The experience inspired Robert to write his book, *Quit Travel Grow*, which combines travel stories with lessons on financial literacy, personal growth and having the courage to pursue a different path when life calls for change. Through stories of the people he met and the places he visited, Robert explores an important question: if life is short, how should we choose to live it?

Reflecting on his decision to leave a successful career behind, Robert says the journey taught him that growth often begins when we have the courage to step into the unknown. Malcolm Glennie - Class of 1959



When Malcolm Glennie recently replied to our birthday wishes, his message was filled not with stories of trophies or honours, but with gratitude for the people and experiences that shaped his childhood. "I spent six years as a boarder at Highbury, arriving as a timid eight-year-old in January 1954 and leaving in December 1959. Those six years placed Malcolm at the heart of one of the most significant periods in Highbury's history.

He remembers founder Sibella McMillan still living on the school grounds and fondly recalls the sight of "Granny's" old car being used to tow the grass cutter. Her son, Elliott McMillan, was Headmaster when Malcolm first arrived. Following Elliott's passing in 1954, Sholto Douglas McMillan took over the leadership of the school, beginning an era that Malcolm believes helped define Highbury.

"I think Sholto made some very astute teaching appointments. Young enthusiastic teachers both in the classrooms and on the sports fields." Malcolm remains in contact with several of his fellow Highbury classmates, and together they still reflect on how fortunate they were to have been taught by such dedicated staff. "While being away from home for large portions of each year was not easy, my years at Highbury were happy and rewarding."

By his final years at the school, Malcolm had established himself as one of the finest all-round pupils of his generation. He captained the Rugby XV, the Cricket XI, and the Hockey team, demonstrating exceptional leadership and maturity well beyond his years. His sporting achievements were remarkable. He was awarded the prize for Most Improved Cricketer and formed part of an outstanding cricket side that included future South African great Mike Procter. The 1959 Highbury yearbook states, "It could be said that primarily our sport successes have been due to the prowess of three boys, Malcolm Glennie, Michael Procter and Jebb McIntosh, though to give all the credit to these three would be unfair to the other members of the teams, and above all to their coach, Mr John Saunders."

In recognition of his outstanding contribution to school life, Malcolm was awarded the prestigious Keith Wimble Cup for the boy who has done the most for the school as well as the Argus Group Bursary to Hilton College, where he continued to excel, later serving as a prefect. Years later, Malcolm and his wife Bev, were invited by Mike and Maryna Procter to attend the naming of the Mike Procter Pavilion as their guests. While trophies gather dust, values and friendships remain for life.
